Mr. R. Wright of National School Studios and Mr. Harold Luebeck are our photographers this year, while the snaps were donated by students.



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
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## The PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

HE school year is drawing to a close and a backward look at the months we have spent together should be both entertaining and rewarding. Such a survey is, of course, the chief purpose of a year book. It will serve to remind us of the joys and sorrows we have experienced and the difficulties we have encountered and overcome. Problems that seemed important at the time can now be thought of lightly because they belong to the past.

A year book helps us to look back, but it also helps us to look forward. As we reflect on our efforts, successful and otherwise, we lay plans for better results next year, better approaches to the tasks involved, and new ideas to be tested and tried. We are bound to feel that each new year will be better than the previous one, and this is as it should be. Optimism is a quality necessary for human progress. The democratic way of life imposes a great trust on all who have a part in it, and it can be successfully maintained only when each individual realizes fully the responsibility it places upon him, and acts accordingly.

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

## Junior Red Cross . . .

Due to the delay in school opening, the Glenlawn Red Cross Committee was rather late with its first meeting. Miss N. Kelly was director, with Eloise Rogers chairman, and Barbara Patterson secretary-treasurer. The initial task is always the enrolment of students in the Canadian Junior Red Cross. This year, as in previous years, the whole student body was enrolled as a unit with the payment of the nominal fee of one dollar. This fee is used for supplies like memberships, literature, magazines and buttons. As an innovation, high school students could buy a special pin at a small cost if they wished. In Glenlawn the idea was quite popular, many members choosing the attractive pins.

The group's first venture in fund raising was a collection of homemade candy which was sold at the "Fall Frolic".

At Christmas, following our school tradition, eight bountiful hampers were made, one packed from each room. They were displayed to good advantage at the Christmas program before being distributed.

During the winter, three Glenlawnites offered their services for outside school

activities. Jean Slobodian for the second time helped in the advertising of the Red Cross Drive, and earned the thanks of the committee. On a few Saturday mornings, Marlene McKinnon and Carol Baker went down to Red Cross headquarters, where they carried out general tasks.

To bolster the sorrowfully low fund, a school-wide collection was taken in March. Then, when the Spring Tea proceeds were allocated, a donation of fifty dollars was made by cheque to Red Cross benefit funds.

We hope that Glenlawnites appreciate the importance of at least one completely charitable organization, for the wholesomeness of a school as busy as ours, and that the Junior Red Cross will grow to be one of the more earnestly supported school activities.

## A Visit to the Legislative Buildings

"... Sixty-eight, sixty-nine, seventy ..." tolled the driver, counting our heads as we filed out of the bus on the grounds in front of the Parliament Building. Although we were all familiar with the sight of this great Manitoba landmark, most of us couldn't help being awed at its huge dimensions, the massive pillars, and spreading stone steps.

Once inside, we were greeted by officers who took charge of our groups, and the tour of the interior began. The first objects to impress us were two bronze bisons, calmly ignoring our passage up the stairway between them. We were led beyond these giants to a round hole in the floor, which, our guide explained, was directly below the centre of the dome. As we still had time to explore before the day's session in the Assembly would begin, we looked at the beautiful royalty reception room, the various meeting rooms, and the excellent library, as well as inspecting the interesting fossils embedded in the limestone pillars and walls.

Inside the chamber, we saw the desks, equipped with loudspeakers, lined so as to form two sections facing each other, with a long wooden table between them. Overhead on the walls and domed ceiling were paintings of allegorical figures. The cork floor was effective in keeping down noise, the guide said, but he cautioned us against jumping up and down to test it, as the members were beginning to arrive and take their places. We filed up into the gallery and stood as prayers were said, and then began the ceremony which opened the session.

The glittering, jewelled mace was carried to the end of the table opposite the Speaker's chair, by a distinguished gentleman, impeccably dressed, and adorned with medals. The mace, with the club end pointed toward the cabinet, lay on a cushion, and remained there even after prayers until the formal discussions of the day were over, when it was placed on a chair. The Speaker himself was a striking figure, with his grey wig, three-cornered cap, and long, black robe.

Many familiar faces appeared in the assembly, among the Liberals, the Cabinet, and the Opposition party. After a great deal of bill-reading by the Speakers, a brief debate on the railway question arose. Our attention was aroused, and we waited for more debates to follow. We blushed deeply when it was called to the Speaker's attention that pupils from "the best school in Greater Winnipeg" (as proclaimed by a member who was a former student here), were present.

We left feeling we had spent an afternoon well. We had become more aware of the responsibilities of the government which represents our interests as a whole. I am sure that I was not the only one who felt patriotic and genuinely proud.



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

## Our Trip to the University

It was a bright, sunshiny winter day when members of the Grade 11 and 12 classes set out for a half-day excursion around the University of Manitoba. To most of us this trip would be not just a pleasant holiday from school, but an insight into future careers, perhaps in engineering, interior design or medicine.

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
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
