


Although the year, 1955-56, has been successful for the Student Council in most respects, this success would have been impossible without the co-operation of our Principal, the Staff, and the Student Body. The Council warmly thanks each and every one,

The trial run of the Constitution drawn up by last year's president has been accomplished, and has proven the Constitution to be an asset to Glenlawn. Thanks are once more extended to Past-President, Bruce Johnston, for the work that he did on this worthwhile project.

Financial matters of the Council were many this year. The major project was the purchase of a back-drop curtain for the stage. To finance this and other projects, a tea, a Variety Show, dances, and a Theatre Night were held. Other undertakings include the sending of two representatives to the U.N. Seminar; the improvement of the P.A. System; and the purchase of shorts for the girls' basketball team, basketball nets, shower curtains, and wing curtains.

In an attempt to increase the scope of school life, a newspaper, "The Glenlawn Roar", produced by a student committee, and a Glee Club, under the direction of Mrs. H. Green, were instituted.

Glenlawn gained recognition this term in sports by winning the Suburban Basketball Championships again; in Health by having our Red Cross chairman, Doreen Lytle, sent to Maryland as Manitoba's representative to the International Red Cross Conference; and in Inter-School life by selling the most tickets of all the schools in Greater Winnipeg, for the Inter-High Variety Concert.

In closing, the Councillors would like to express their hope that they have achieved their objective in making 1955-1956 a year to be remembered.

This year we began our Junior Red Cross activities with Miss N. Kelly as director, Doreen Lytle as chairman, June Harding as secretary-treasurer, and Allen Lansdown as assistant director.
