The Council wishes to thank everyone who participated in the year's activities and made them a success.



Romeo's buddy—enjoys aiming missles at Brandy—especially in between periods. Future unknown. Interests unlimited.


#### BETTY-RUTH GILLIES

# JUNIOR RED CROSS



We began our Junior Red Cross activities this year with Miss Kelly as director, Barry Hawkins as chairman, and Beatrice Lechner as secretary-treasurer. The first project of the Glenlawn Junior Red Cross Committee was the undertaking of a Sock and Mitt Drive to aid the Hungarian refugees. Approximately 169 articles of wool were collected and they were greatly appreciated by the Red Cross. The next project was for a hamper to be given to some needy family. Through the students' wonderful co-operation, this project was a huge success and we would like to thank all who helped make it that.

Two boys go to St. George Hospital once a week and play games with the men polio patients. A variety show was held at Trinity Hall for the Senior Citizens group on March 25. Thanks to those who participated and made this project possible. The Junior Red Cross received the proceeds of the home cooking from the Spring Tea, amounting to approximately \$70. The total sum will be given to much the same as years before half to the Crippled Children's Fund and half to the Convalescent Unit of the Children's Hospital.

Once again we of the Junior Red Cross Committee would like to thank the students of Glenlawn for their hearty support.





"Nip ups, short arms, headstands", became accepted jargon around the halls as tumbling enjoyed a revival.


Track and field closes the sports year. This year an outstanding performance is anticipated due to Russell Syke's farsighted planning and the hard work of the athletes.
