The Social Committee, with chairman Barb Johnston, helped in what we have always wanted—four truly enjoyable school dances. The Sports Committee and Publicity Committee, with chairmen

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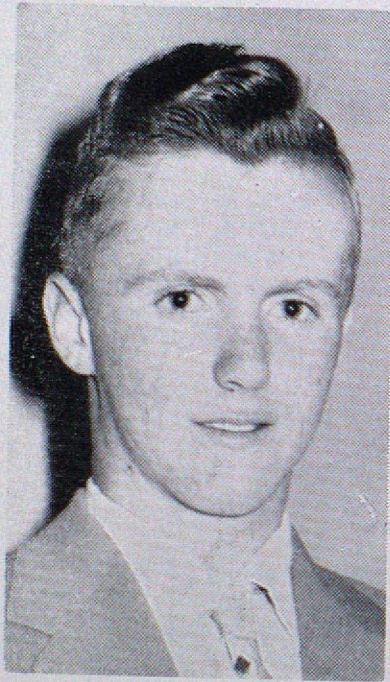

BARBARA DUNSTONE

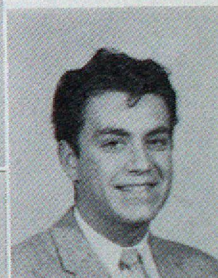

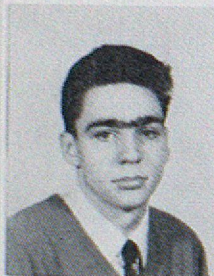

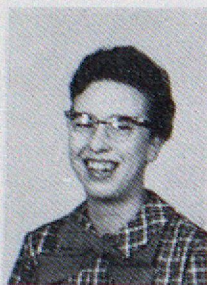
DIANE HEAD

ALLAN WHICKER

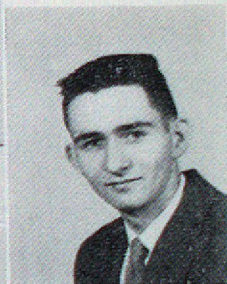

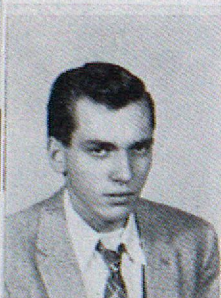

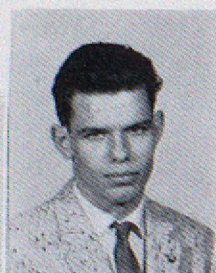
SPENCER ALDWINCKLE

Ron's the boy to see if you are ever interested in planes. Pals with Mervyn. Destiny: To build model airplanes.



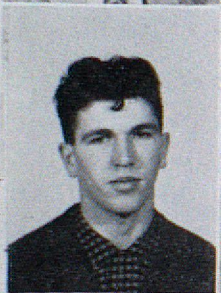
THOMAS FAIR

Room 23's Sport Rep. Played for the school's basketball team. What are the ambitions, Ian?



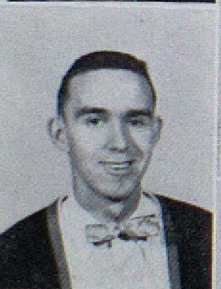
ROBERT HOLLIDAY

The old philosopher, who is often seen reading up on the facts of life. Says that he will never understand those unpredictable creatures called girls.



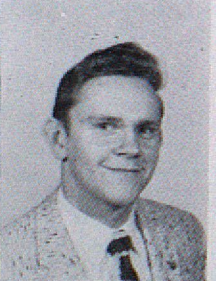
BILL HODGSON

Bill also plays for the school basketball team. Has owned several cars, but hasn't found one that satisfies him yet. Destiny: Collecting antique cars.



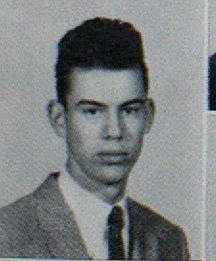
BILL HUNTER

Ed is very quiet, studious, and shy. Tell us the reason why, Eddie?



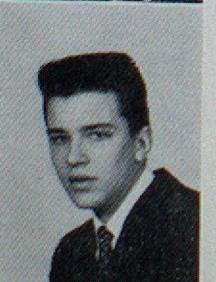
RON NICKLE

DIANE THOMPSON

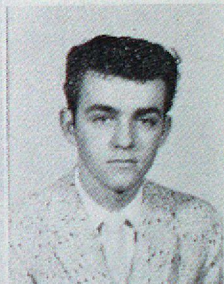
Room 23's Roar Rep. A sincere and well-liked student who barely makes it to her desk before the last bell goes.

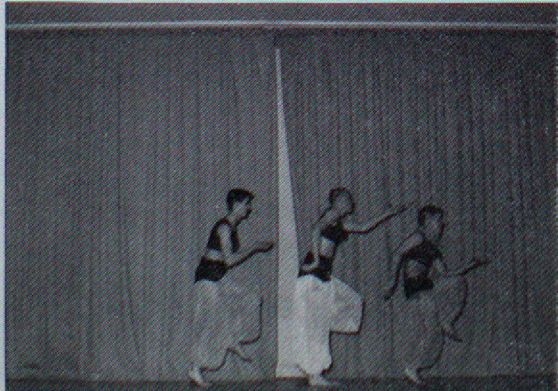

A special note of thanks goes to Mr. Gaudreau, without whose able coaching this would never have been possible.

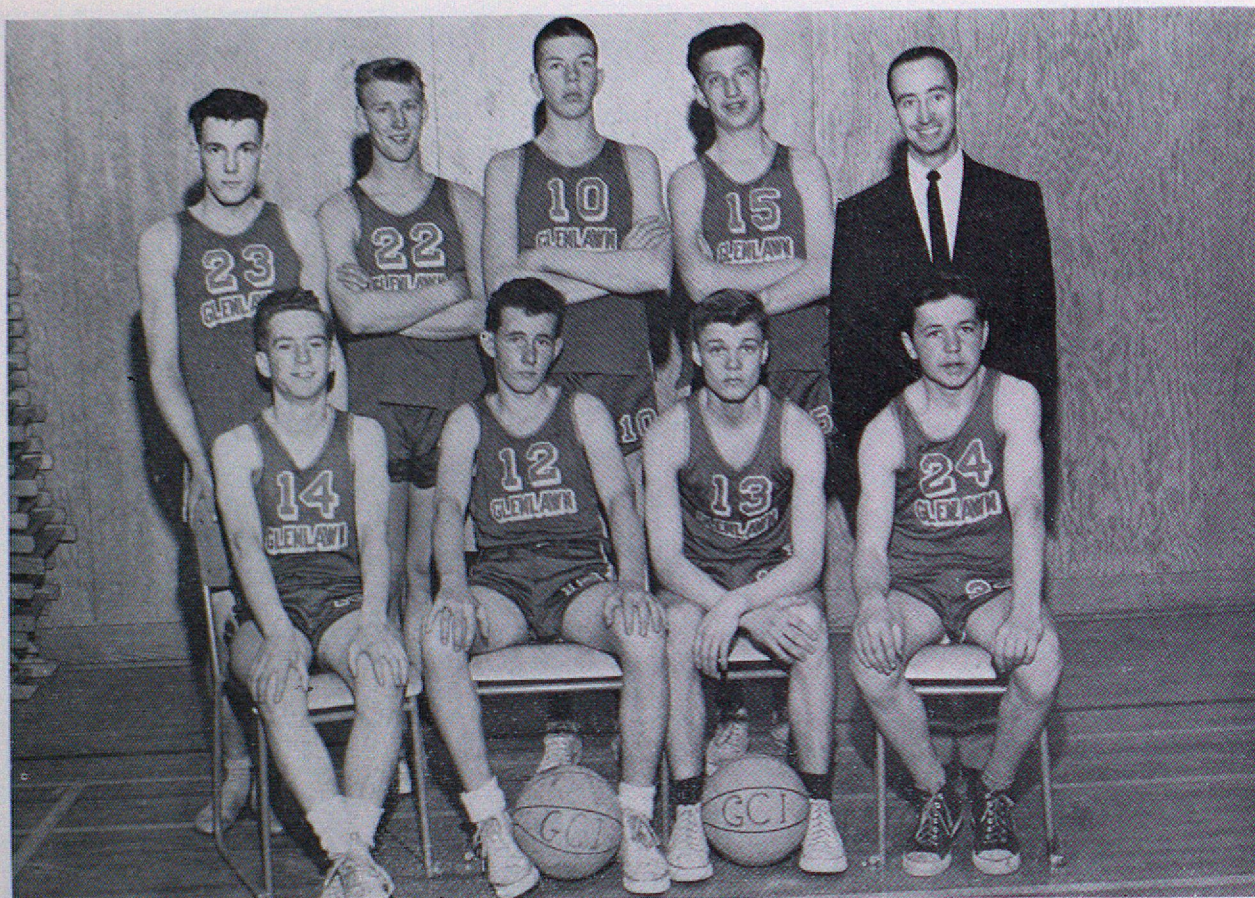

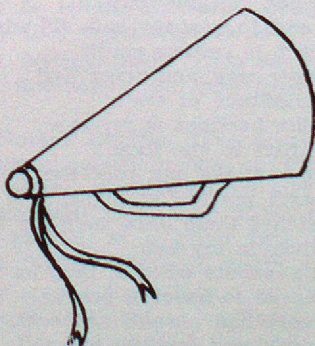

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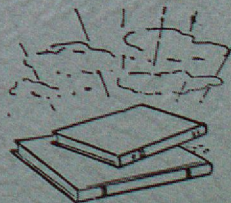
**firemaking

In primitive living, producing fire was one of man's more important developments in his struggle to master the physical world. After the white traders came to North America the natives traded their furs for flints and steels and used these for firemaking. Indians carried these in beaded skin pouches called firebags, and used dry seeds as kindling to blow on and start the fire from the flint sparks.
