
In concluding, we offer our congratulations to the graduates of 1959-60 and we wish them every success in the future.





Glenlawn: Then and Now

To picture Glenlawn Collegiate's growth over its approximately thirty-six years' existence is to make one's imagination practice the hop-step-jump. Indeed, our Senior High School's entire history might be described as a moving experience. In its comparatively short life, Glenlawn has been located on two different sites, its building having passed through three major stages of construction in the past ten years alone.

Beginning with its foundations in the School Districts of Glenwood and Glenlawn, our Collegiate acquired its name when these two districts were amalgamated in 1930. Then the High School, already centred at Norberry, came to serve the entire Glenlawn School

District No. 1499, its name commemorating its composite nature. While, by the changes of 1959, this School District became St. Vital School Division No. 6, the Collegiate continues under its original name, but it now serves an area enlarged to include Lavallee, St. Germain, Mountbatten and Vermette Schools.

To realize how swiftly Glenlawn has grown, we recall Mr. S. Burland's article in Glenmories 1950. Writing as Chairman of the School Board (1950) and also as the first principal of the first Glenlawn, he states that the pioneer Grade XI class, graduates of 1924, numbered five students, instructed by himself

We're Getting Bigger - Fast

Shortly after the new year we began to move, by stages, into the new addition to our Collegiate. We started on the second floor and progressed to the basement areas as successive stages of completion were reached. Up to that time we had been operating with staggred classes. The Grade X's, not used to getting up in the morning, looked rather sleepy-eyed for the first week.

It might be pointed out that this was the second "new addition". The first can hardly be called "old" as it was opened in September of 1957. The original section was opened in January of 1950. From 1924 to 1950, the Glenlawn Collegiate was a part of Norberry School.

The latest addition, costing approximately half a million dollars, gives the pupils in St. Vital secondary education privileges on a par with the very best in this province. To begin with, fourteen new classrooms were added together with two new laboratories, one for chemistry, and one for biology. A full size gymnasium was added as was an administrative office for the principal and a staff room. The basement area

was reorganized and enlarged to include all the industrial arts areas and three new home economics areas. As a final touch we have a cafeteria with a servery capable of accommodating 200 pupils for lunch. This is a welcome and necessary adjunct as many pupils have to travel seven or eight miles every day to reach school. In the old section of the building considerable improvement was effected to provide enlarged areas for the commercial classes, a text book storage room, and an administrative office and board room.

The citizens who pay for the facilities, the school board which plans them, and the pupils who enjoy the privilege of them, all have the right to be proud.

Now, what of the future? In 1950, when the present Collegiate was opened, the enrolment was 240. At the present time, it is approximately 600. By this September it will be at least 650. In the fall of 1961 it will be approximately 850, which is the maximum enrolment for the present building. By the fall of 1962, it is expected that the high school enrolment in St. Vital will be in excess of 1100 pupils. We are getting bigger—and very quickly.

(Continued from page 8) and by Miss K. McKinnell, at Norberry School. This small beginning was followed by rapidly increasing numbers of students, still at Norberry, until the stucco and frame building on the present site was opened in January, 1950. By that time a Collegiate Institute, Glenlawn 10 years ago, had nine teachers and about 220 students. The Industrial Arts instructors, in addition, were at Glenwood, where their departments continued to be housed until recently. The new Collegiate quarters had eight classrooms, one containing the library; offices and staff rooms; a laboratory, combining facilities for chemistry, physics, and the other sciences taught; a typing room with forty-two typewriters; and finally, the longed-for auditorium.

Another "moving experience" of 1950, THE flood, did not hinder Glenlawn's growth. In 1954 the auditorium was enlarged to its present size, with a stage and dressing-rooms added. Then, with heavy enrolments and crowded classrooms, future expansion was inevitable. The next wind, of brick and concrete block construction, was opened in September, 1957. In spite of six more classrooms, a new typing room, a physics laboratory, an Industrial Arts department for the boys, and a library including a stack room and a reading room, this wing also became overcrowded. The new School Division's contribution to swelling the enrolment, a feature of 1959-60, made further building an urgent need. This construction has been a matter of intense interest and adventure for all concerned, bringing about, as it did, "the half-day system" for the

fall term. Once before, in 1956-57, several classes of Grade X had to be housed separately, because of the overcrowded Collegiate building. They were accommodated in Glenwood School. This year, "staggered hours" were the answer to the chronic problem, with Grades XI and XII attending for the first half of the day, and Grade X in the second "shift". Starting early in January, Glenlawn occupied its new quarters stage by stage, moving in as fast as the workmen moved out. Facilities have come to include 14 new classrooms, a staff room and administrative offices, new laboratories for chemistry and biology; a Home Economics department, more Shops, and a cafeteria, besides a whole new gymnasium, with offices and seating space for spectators. Small wonder that visitors are often found wandering in bewilderment and admiration, as they view these swift changes in Glenlawn's physical appearance! Glenlawn's staff and students too, have known the challenges of exploring.

And now the thirty-seventh Graduating Class of this Collegiate prepares to leave. Of the total enrolment of approximately 590, the Grade Eleven and Twelve students number well over 300. They are followed by the Grade Tens, about 270 in number; all are headed by the Superintendent, the Principal and the Vice-Principal, and a teaching staff of thirty-three. Contrast this picture with that of the Graduating Class of 1924! It may well be with a sense of awe and of deep gratitude that we review these phases of Glenlawn's history over the past three and a half decades, before we once more face a challenging future.




Ivy doing an excellent take-off of Shelley Berman. To close the first half of the show, our acclaimed Tumbling Team put on a fine display of gymnastics.



In March, 1858, a few "Yankee" prospectors had gone down the Fraser on the steamer "Otter", to San Francisco with gold dust and nuggets. News travelled fast! Thousands of hopeful men stormed into Victoria.

to Victoria. Needless to say, Victoria "grew up" overnight. These gold-seekers pitched their tents outside of

the fort's stockade.

In groups of two's, ten's, or over 500, the miners began moving up the Fraser. The men built crude rafts and poled themselves over rivers, with pack horses swimming behind. Others went in canoes or dugouts. Sometimes, several canoes would be lashed together with wagons full of supplies braced across the canoes. Their axes had to "cut the way" over windfall, steep banks and precipitous cliffs. Some men attempted rock walls barefoot; or else hid their canoes, and tied their supplies to dogs' backs or else to their own shoulders. The trail was very dangerous.

By pack train and canoe the miners travelled up to Alexandria, Quesnel and Fort George. Late in 1859, of gravel on the banks of both lakes yielded as much the men reached Lakes Quesnel and Cariboo. Pockets as two hundred dollars a day. On Horse Fly Creek, hundred of nuggets were found in a week.

In the spring of 1861, Antler Creek had proved to be the beginning of the rush to Cariboo. The goldseekers scrambled northward and eastward. The stream known as Lightning Creek proved to be one of the richest creek in Cariboo. It yielded \$100,000 in three weeks. In one year \$2,500,000 was shipped from Cariboo.

For seven miles along Williams Creek worked two thousand men. The luckiest of all the miners, Cariboo Cameron, took \$150,000 out of his claim in three months. In 1863, Williams Creek yielded \$1,500,000. From 1859 to 1871, \$25,000,000 was taken from Cariboo Country.

What became of the lucky prospectors? John Rose, one of the founders of the Cariboo, disappeared in 1863, after having gone into Bear River Country. Cariboo Cameron died a poor man in 1888. Billy Deitz, after whom a famous creek was named, died penniless in Victoria; many others died, unknown to history.

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
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
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
