
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
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


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
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#### EDITORIAL

The Student Council, along with the work of two members, Diane Lamoureux and Nicollet Holub, designed an official school jacket, and supplied rings to the students.





Lydia S. has quite a score bowling; In the aisle with bad jokes she keeps us a-rolling.


