



# ATHLETICS ATHLETICS

### FRESHMAN BOYS' BASKETBALL


































### **GLENLAWN TRACK TEAM**

# Freshie day






















Held, April 8-11, here is a following commentary:



And the final results? The grade elevens won the week by no more than 600 points, inching the twelves. Way down the race were the tens and won nothing and remained distant third.






























### MUNA

Something like a snapshot half developed, half displayed.


No, our thoughts were on the clock as if counted the minutes away.

It is ourselves who may deliver us, or sentence tribulation.




























# Editor's message
