




From the age of uniformity, from the age of solitude, from the age of Big Brother, from the age of double-think,—greetings!"



ever finished with discovering and developing.



I know that Glenlawn is an exciting school because of the kinds of people who are here, students and staff. To each of you, thank you for your contribution. And to the graduates, my best wishes.













Terry Fox Run


On Ice





























































A Show of Talent





They participated in the Manitoba Indoor Games, Boeing Classic, Steinbach Indoor Games and Brandon Age Class Meet.



























Geography Trips

Ten different teams of 5 people each set out from the west gate, armed with only a compass, a map, a ruler, and a pen. We had to end up at the opposite gate.



The first people to arrive at the finish were Matt Booth, Bob Zackarias, Don Beaton, Derek Griffiths and Kim Cumming.



As the smoke clears and the dead are carried away, you hear the applause and realize that you are at last accepted by your community, and they no longer fear that you will molest their daughters.






International Economic Order. We also proclaimed 1985 the Year of the Youth.


Both Lelia and Michele had written a few words about their experiences as exchanges students. But unfortunately a few mishaps and crises have prevented their essays from being submitted.





















The Class of '84



Many of the graduates were surprised at Mr. Keddies odd (read: warped and twisted) adaptations of their ambitions for their futures.



























