I wish you, the graduates, every success in the future!

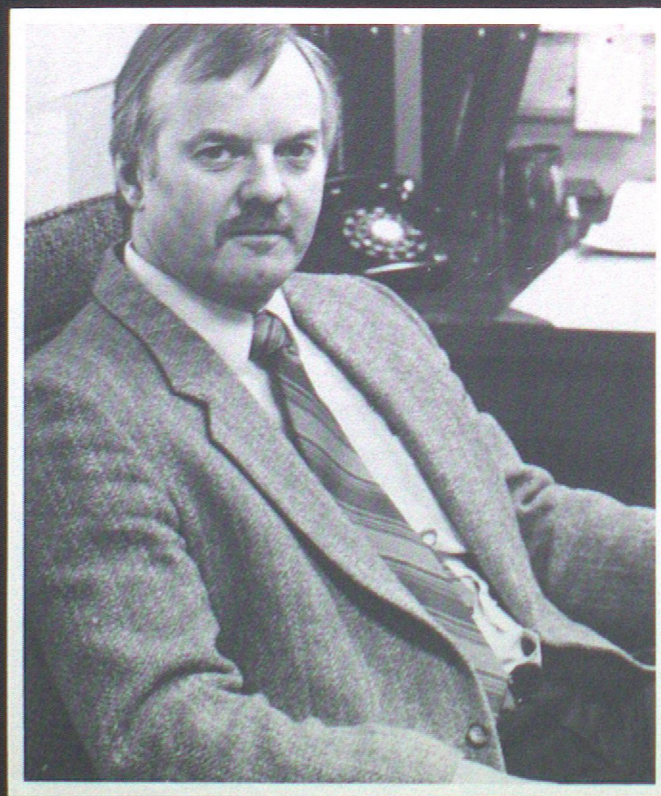

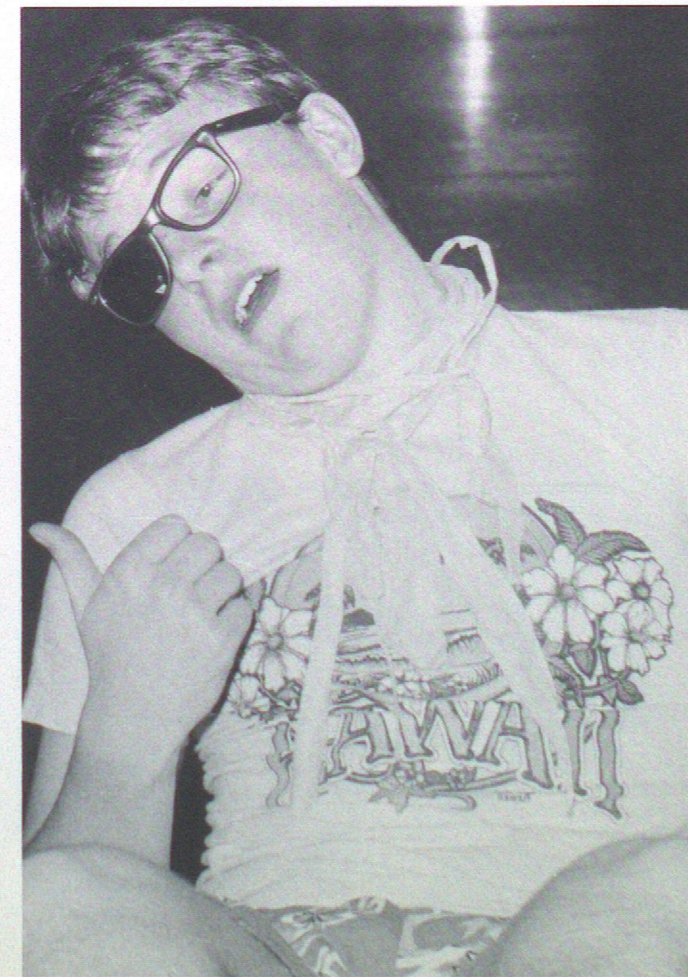
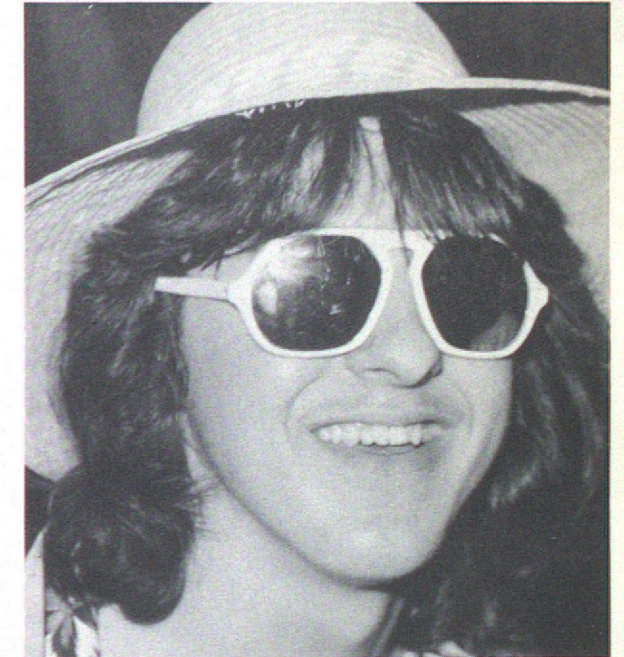
AIR BAND

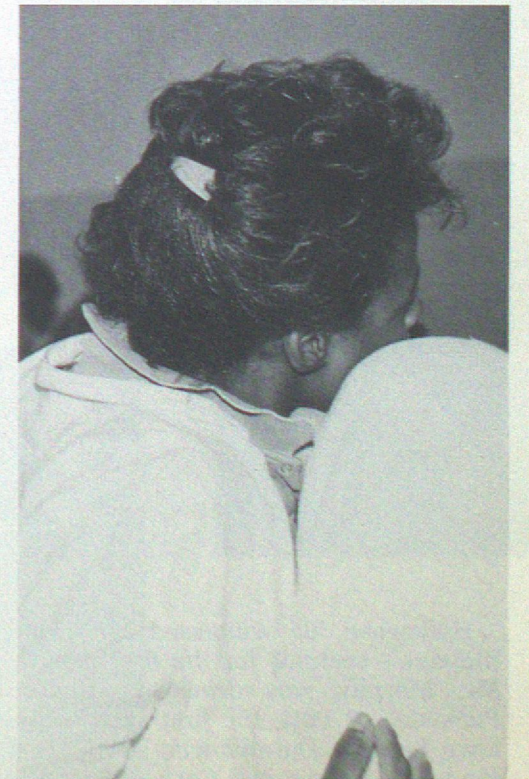

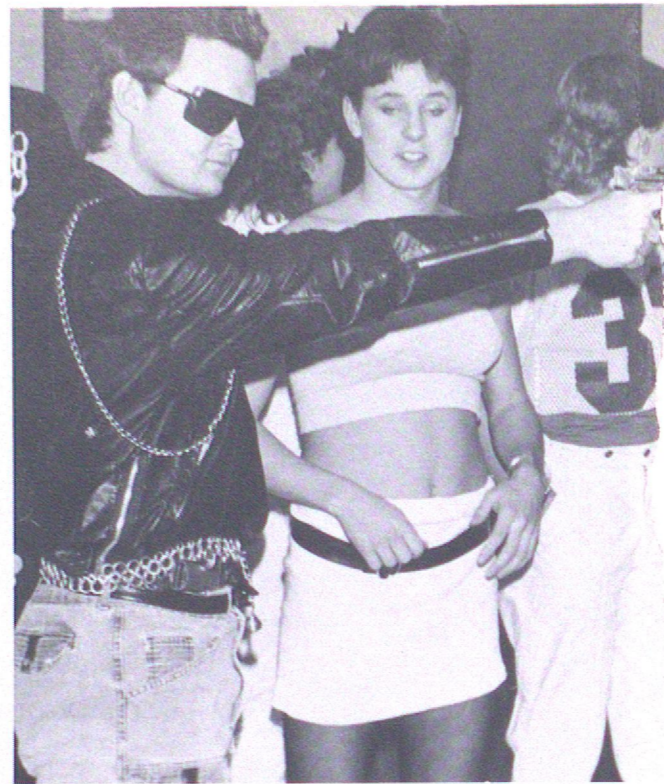
Spirit Week

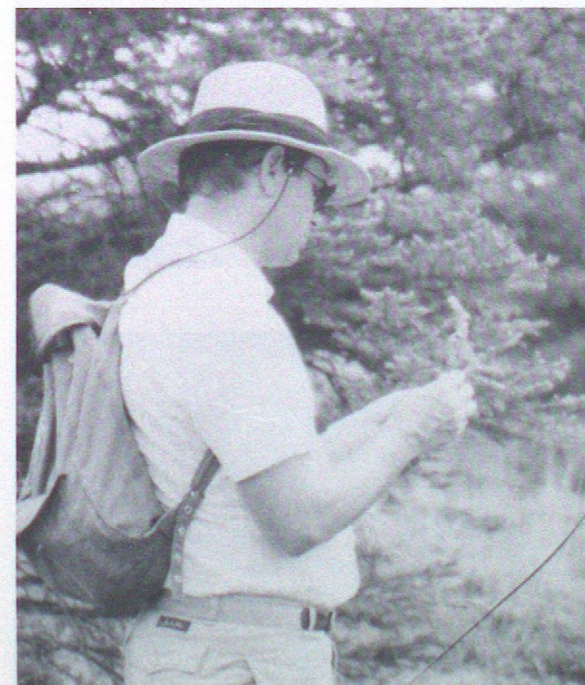
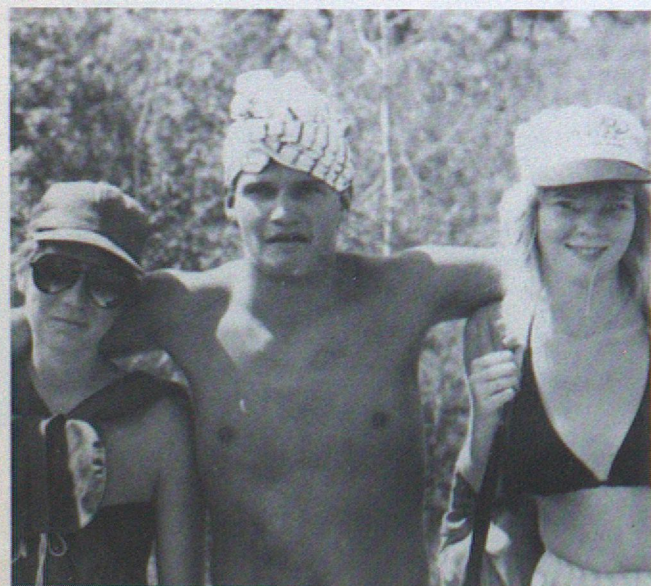
CARBERRY DESERT

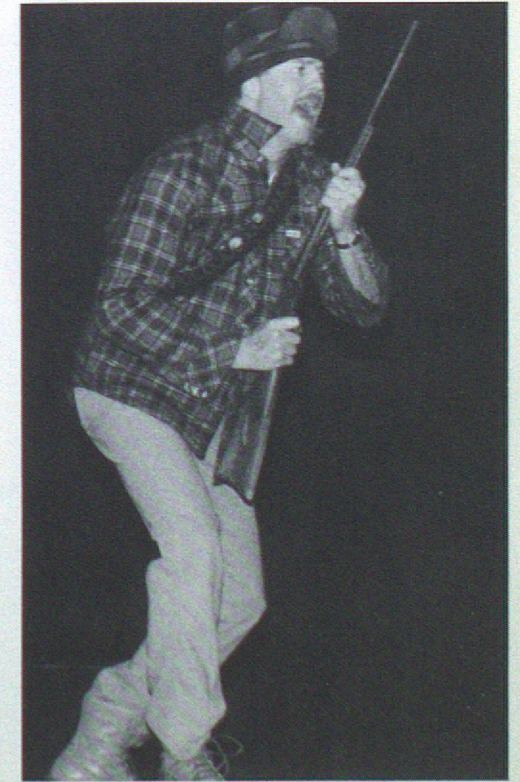
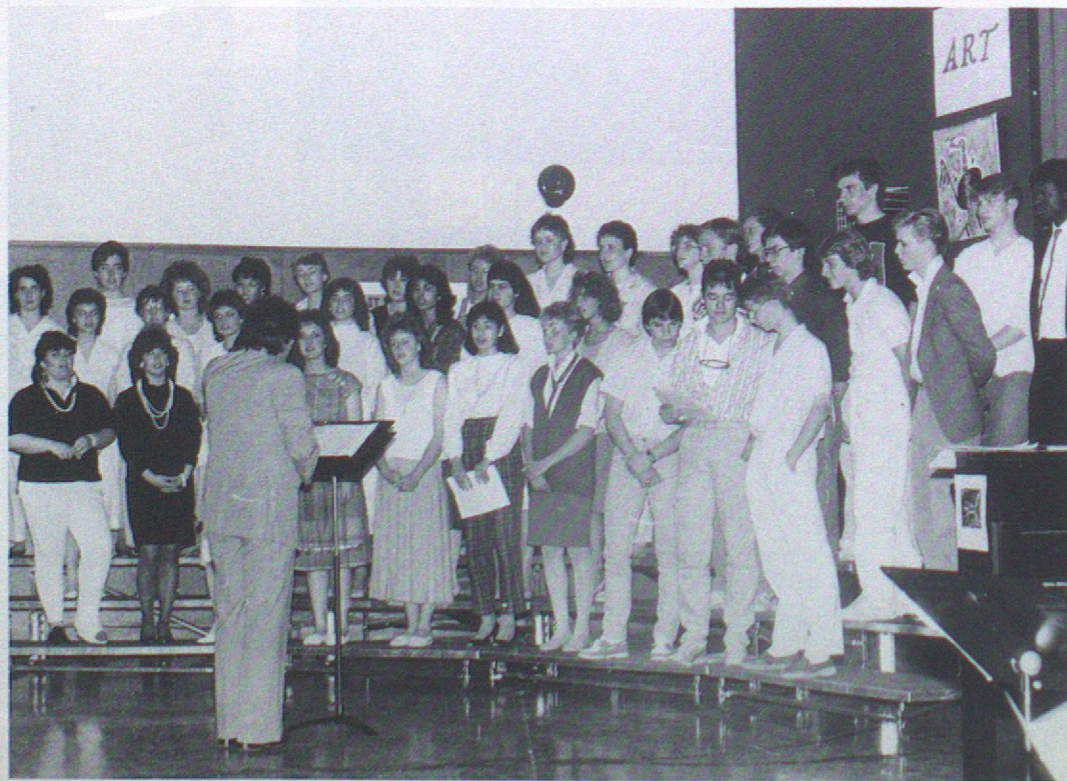

Congratulations on a good season.

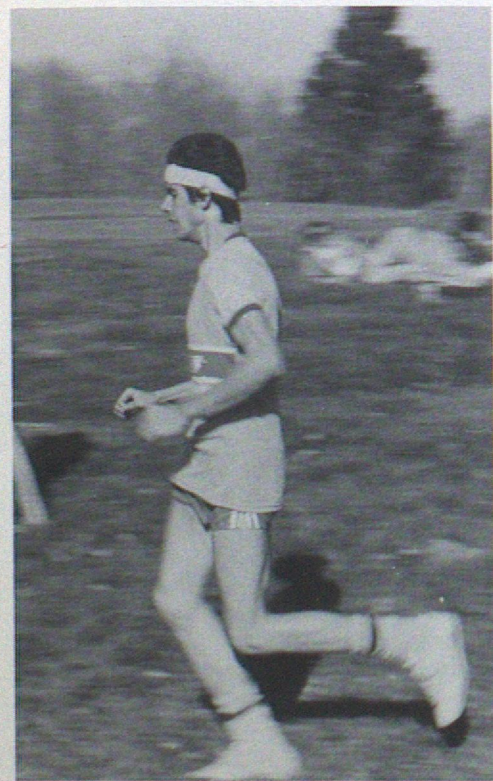

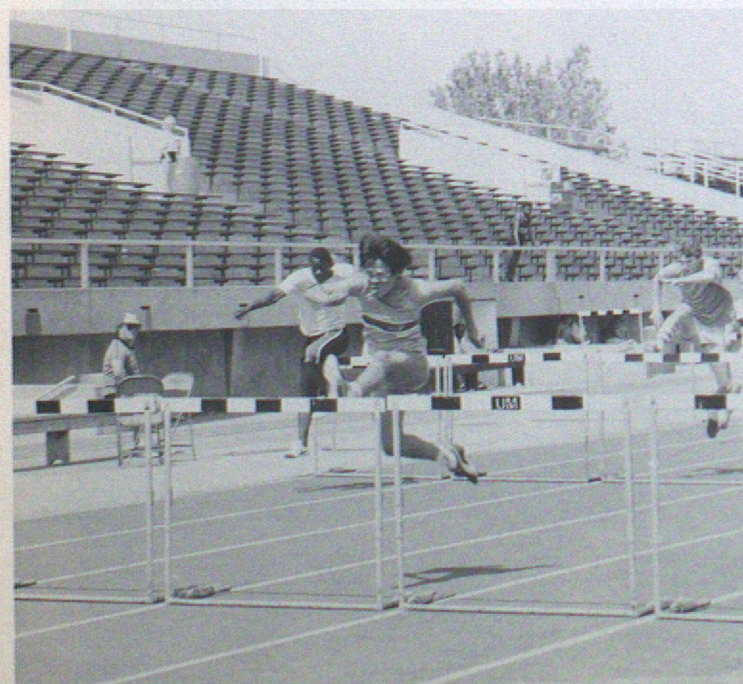
FULL STEAM AHEAD

When all the sections of the challenge are complete, it is anticipated that the principal will present the bronze certificates to students in June. Later in the year the Provincial Council will organize the presentation of the award pins by the Mayor.

Graduation: sunset of a beautiful past, sunrise of a bright tomorrow.

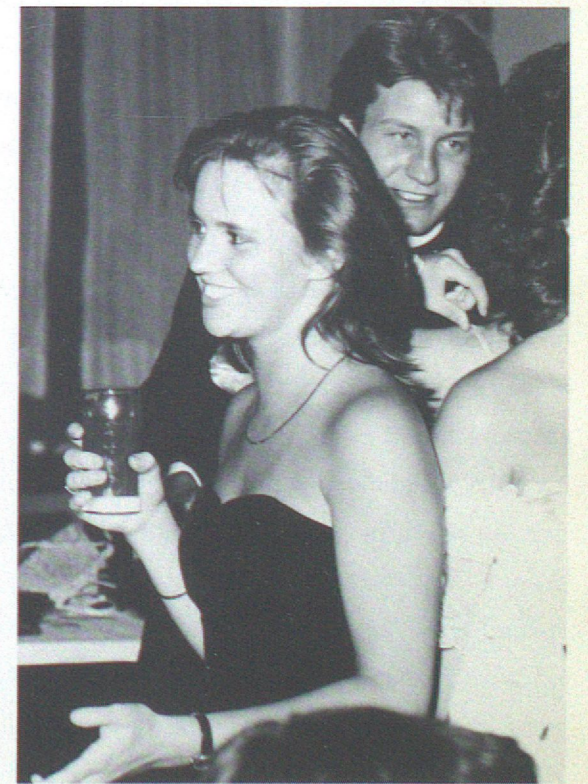

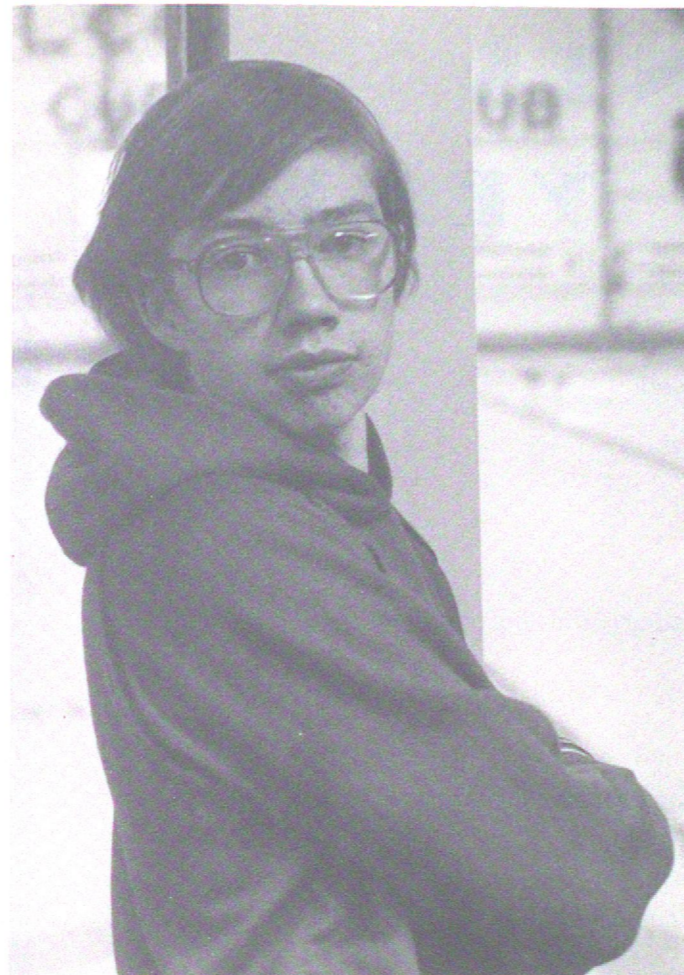
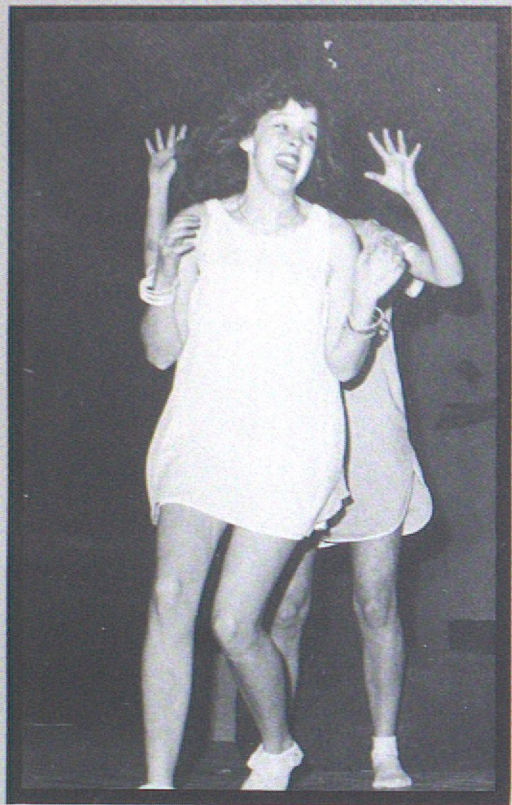
