Developing Leaders


The Canadian Council for Aboriginal Business operates the FAAY, the Foundation for the Advancement of Aboriginal Youth. Canada's oldest, general purpose Aboriginal scholarship and bursary program for college, university and high school students from each of Canada's 'heritage' groups. This scholarship and bursary program is dedicated to developing the next generation of Aboriginal leaders. By encouraging Aboriginal youth to stay in school, FAAY bridges the gap

between the reality which the kids confront in their communities and the opportunities available to those with higher education. It awarded 130 bursaries and scholarships, worth an estimated \$250 000 on behalf of corporate partners. Successful candidates must demonstrate a willingness to learn and to persevere. They demonstrate a willingness to give of their time to their communities. Though FAAY students come from all over Canada, they all share a burning desire to make a better life for themselves, their families and their communities. One of these successful candidates was our very own Jimmy Lee Smith. Jimmy Lee is a kind and caring individual that never seems to tire of helping his family or friends. Internship Programs



Glenlawn students and their little cubs learn a lot together in the Childcare Program.



As part of their course work they study the needs and development of children from the prenatal stage to the pre-school years. This course is great for preparation for parenting or careers involving children.



The science club had a wind up on June 2 to celebrate all the hard work and marvelous effort of all the club members this year and to plan for next year, which we hope will be even better!





World of Work

In education, one size does not fit all! Glenlawn's World of Work program is noteworthy because it meets the needs of students who are eager to join in the work force upon graduation and who want to be well prepared to get an interesting and fulfilling job. W.O.W. consists of three blocks of compulsory work experience during the school year. Each block is three weeks long.

During the three week work block, the students experience the responsibility and demands of a "real" job, a first for many of the students. Students are evaluated by both the employer and W.O.W. teaching staff. Students are encouraged to choose different work experiences over the course of the year. Their many options might include retail sales, the restaurant/ hospitality industry, child care, personal care homes, office work, automotive businesses and construction.

Many of the students impressed their work experience employers that they are offered part time employment (this time for pay!). Some students get full time permanent employment as a direct result of their work experience success. Another excellent result of work experience is an updated and improved resume.

As one of the satisfied employers commented, 'This program benefits both the student and the employer'. The student who is with me right now is a valued employee. I WILL find a job for her. I don't want to lose her." Now that is something to *roar* about.

All in all, a great year.


