





Our staff had another oustanding year here at Glenlawn. Classrooms were filled with energy and enthusiasm from both teachers and learners.




We had an incredibly successful year in Grade 10. In September, we continued building on the Lion spirit that grew within us in Grade 9.


We were incredibly involved throughout 2010. In fact, more students were a part ofclubs and teams than any other group of 10's that had come through GCI.


Grade 11


The 11's also represented Glenlawn with pride as they went off to Encounters in Ottawa and to Europe for a week.


The English Language Arts courses offered at Glenlawn Collegiate are enriched with a multitude of useful skills that will serve students in a plethora of contexts.





Through the Writer's Workshop, we explore the construction of memoirs, short stories, essays, narrative poetry, and other literary formats.























It is invaluable in helping students improve their knowledge and use of the English Language. The course also introduces Canadian culture to students.


We can't help but be curious in Science; the Universe has a whole lot to tell us, and our science teachers are more than willing to help us listen.




































The grade 10's learned about physical geopgraphy, environmental industries, and general mapping skills and knowledge. We even had the chance to create our own city!

As always, 2010/2011 was a memorable year in the Geography department.






















Photoshop Mr. Harder so he looks bald? Give Mr. Young a digital head start on "Movember"? Not a problem if you were in Information Technology!



"Info Tech" was a blast, but it also set us up with fundamental ICT skills we need to be succesful in future courses and careers.






















If you're interested in the French language, Mme. Arnal's room is the place to be. She teaches all of our French classes here at GCI.


Glenlawn's Industrial Arts program has been going strong for over 20 years.

In Woods, Mr. Heintz teaches his students about different types of woods. They use them to construct tables, entertainment units, and other projects.


In Graphics, Ms. Merriman teaches her students how to airbrush, develop photos, and various aspects of design using computer software.













It makes sense then that Glenlawn mathematics will help you to grow and change in ways that will advance both your appreciation of our world, as well as your personal efficacy within it.
















We'd like to give a special "Thank You" to all of the students who kept our school looking vibrant and creative with their amazing artwork!





























SpiritWeek 2011

The Badminton team also had one of their most successful seasons in recent memory. We had an amazing 42 athletes participate in SCAC league play this year.

















Valedictorian Address

Good afternoon students, teachers, family and friends. I would like to begin by thanking each of you not only for joining us today, but for everything you have given us as a graduating class and done for us throughout our time at Glenlawn.
