Her boundless good humor and energy are in the service of learning for every person, and through her, this service is becoming our prime and focused mission. Irene cares for all facets of the child's life and anticipates that staff will do the same. Her vision of the school for students is a safe and uplifting environment where achievement can occur. This vision is realized through



her actions. Her positive and caring acts are of such depth that they encompass with grace what are always difficult but necessary parts of a principal's job. She doesn't defend the indefensible. Serious breaches receive serious attention. Every person is expected to give respect, not in order to enforce some hierarchical power structure, but to draw forth the dignity that is within us. Through her care for the dignity of all, our school is safe, relaxing and conducive to having every child get the best possible education.

Che leads by showing true respect herself.

She demonstrates deep respect for the capacities and potential of others by the way she shares power and encourages others. Distributed leadership is more than an ideal with Irene. Staff is now in the position of forming the school plan and implementing it. The role of administration is never abrogated at Glenlawn; it is extended.

Her respect is not contingent, and this provides a safe and stable foundation that allows others to experiment reflectively. She encourages and supports true growth, recognizing that this process is messy, nonlinear and not guaranteed. However, the very support she gives and the importance she places on this growth make it virtually impossible for a person not to grow profes-

sionally and personally.

I rene is Glenlawn's umbrella. Her energy and respect reach out over everyone, and she deflects the worst of the storms from above, sometimes at cost to herself. These costs are never mentioned – it would detract from the service to students – but they are there. Her selfless and humble approach brings us all together to work hard for professional growth, for our colleagues and for kids

ndie is graduating this year. and is ready for the transition from school to post-graduate life. We are really going to miss you,





However, leaving is a ways off yet and we plan to make our remaining time here a blast to be remembered for a lifetime.
























y name means "faith." I am 18 years old and V I I was born in a small town called Mega in Ethiopia. I come from a large family of 15 brothers and 15 sisters. My dad has 30 children and my mother has 10 children; 8 girls and 2 boys. I am the youngest child of my mother's children. My father used to be a teacher and a pastor. Later on, he became a farmer. Life was harder for my father as a farmer, but he did his best to send us all to school and to take care of us.

began School when I was 8. Ethiopian school is much harder than school in Canada. Most of the classes were lectures with lots of homework and many class activities. In Canada, school is easier. There is not as much homework, kinder teachers, and computers are available for student use. There is also a freedom of speech; in Ethiopia, there is no freedom of speech. To speak your mind is considered rude. Another difference is that in Ethiopia, most families do not send their girls to school. School is for boys. But in Canada, everyone is treated the same. In Ethiopia, girls are expected to stay at

home and help their mothers with chores like fetching water, cooking and collecting firewood.

hen I was 11 years old, I went to Kenya to visit my brother and his my brother and his family, and I will never go back to Ethiopia again. My brother had a business where he sold goats and he wanted me to stay with him and help take care of his family. I lived in Kenya for about 6 years before coming to Canada. Kenya isn't a safe country like Canada. People steal things from each other and fight a lot. I was so scared because every night I would hear guns shooting. I once saw a woman stab another with a knife with my own eyes. She stabbed a man too. There was no one looking after me when this happened, and it was just me and my little brother.

bout two years after, my brother closed his shop as business was not going well. It was then I began to go to they understood what had Islamic school. It was February 2, 2007 at 6 in the evening. I was coming home from my sister's house. There were men hiding and waiting for me on

the street I was walking. They kidnapped me and tied a cloth over my eyes so I could not see where they were taking me. I had no idea where they took me. Three of them left, but one of them remained with me. He told me he wanted me to be his wife. I refused him but then everything turned upside down. In my culture, it is normal for the man to choose the woman he wants to marry, but I don't agree with this idea. My brother had accepted an offer for my sister, but my sister said no. After 3 days, he brought me to his house to be his wife. We stayed there for about 10 days, and then to my surprise, my sister showed up with 2 police officers. The police arrested the men who had captured me. That moment in equal rights for all: men, in my life made me. worried and depressed. My sister took me to her house and I stayed with her. She took me to the Human Rights Centre to make a statement, and once happened to me, they took us to the Centre to stay. We stayed there for about 2 years. The organization that helped us is called I.O.M. (Internationa

Organization for Migration). They helped us a lot. They first talked to the U.S. Embassy, then they talked to the Canadian Embassy, and it finally got us accepted to leave Kenya. My life changed after that.

was happy to know I was coming to Canada, but I was sad that the rest of my family was fighting because of me. I came to Canada on December 17th, 2009. Everything was so different that day. It was the first time I traveled across the ocean and the first time on a plane. I came to a different culture, people and language. Here in Canada everyone has equal rights, no matter who

n the future, I want to become a Social Worker. I believe women, Christian, Musilm, people with disabilities, or people of different races. I want to fight for people. I believe that in Canada I have the opportunities to go far with my goals.



If you could liken Mr. Kirichenko to any famous mathematician, Pythagoras might be near the mark. Pythagoras was well travelled (and Mr. K. loves to travel) and he taught math. (Parallels are obvious. The pun was atrocious). More than that, both men have a deep connection to the mystical. For Mr. Kirichenko, the world of math has a depth and mystery that is essential, subtle and the source of much intellectual striving and pleasure.

Pythagoras was a mystic too. He built up a cult of believers around the notion that everything in the world was governed by number. (I don't believe there was any mention of tropical fish or chess, though.) His followers had several strictures placed upon them, one of them con-

cerning the avoidance of beans.


And this is where Mr. K. and Pythagoras part company, because whether it is in eating black bean soup or in demonstrating his zest for life, Mr. K. is full of beans.

Mr.Kirichenko is passionate about thinking; matters philosophical or mathematical are of the greatest interest to him and he pursues these ideas and others in his reading. But it isn't only in the realm of the mind that he participates. He is a physical man. Gene cycles, he dances, he cartoons, he cooks, he plays raquetball, and he does it all with verve. That friskiness is with us still: he can do 80 pushups without a break. Mr.K. is full of beans indeed!

Intelligence might be defined as the capacity to grow and adapt effectively to changing situations. I think Mr. K. has demonstrated great intelligence in his implementation of a variety of new practices over the past few years. He bases his changes on thoughtful analysis and experimentation and supporting philosophy. He seeks new ideas, he considers their merits and he experiments, modifying as he goes so that students have the best education he can give them. It has been my honour and inspiration to watch Mr. K's pedagogical growth over time.



n 1973, at the age of 15, Rick Hansen's life changed forever. He was involved in an accident that paralyzed him from the waist down. Coming to terms with his new life, he found inspiration from teachers, coaches and family, and set new goals from new dreams. Rick went on to become one of Canada's most decorated Paralympic athletes. In March 1985, Rick set off from Vancouver to wheel 40,000 kilometres through 34 countries on the Man In Motion World Tour to prove the potential of people with disabilities. His 26-month journey inspired an entire nation to believe anything is possible and moved thousands to make a difference. 
game. The girls showed tremendous sportsmanship, great heart, and terrific clutch play as they came from the #4 ranking to win it

Special thanks goes out to all our travellers who represented Glenlaws in the highest of standards.









