
# Starting at 10.


### WHAT'S THE MATTER WITH CHEMISTRY?

The ultimate frisbee history begins with Joel Silver, a graduate of Lafayette College, proposed a school Frisbee team on a whim in the fall of 1968. The following spring, a group of students got together to play what Silver claimed to be the "ultimate game experience," adapting the sport from a form of Frisbee football, likely learned from Jared Kass while attending a summer camp at Northfield Mount Hermon, Massachusetts where Kass was teaching. The students who played and codified the rules at Columbia High School in Maplewood, New Jersey, were an eclectic group of

students including leaders in academics, student politics, the student newspaper, and school dramatic productions.

Waterpolo had a much earlier entrance into the sports scene. Back in 1870, the London Swimming Club drew up the first rules for this football game in the water. They accepted brute strength and dunking opponents was permitted, as well as diving with the ball and carrying it under the swimsuit in murky water towards the goal. Well, the water is WAY cleaner now and it would be pretty

tough to sneak the ball into your swimsuit. In the original rules, goalkeepers stayed out of the water and jumped in when a player from the opposing team approached to score. Not any more. Now the goalie stays in net and that's a good thing. On two occasions we've witnessed Goalies scoring. Rule changes over the years have made the game faster, and brute strength was replaced by more technique, speed and tactical moves. Having said that, it can be a little 'rough' out there, especially with so many novices up against ranked Provincial players.



















### VALEDICTORYADDR

It has been profoundly inspiring to work with such an energetic individual so dedicated to improving learning for absolutely everyone.






