But I wrote this poem so I'm kind of biased I guess.


As for the rest of this?



I look forward to working with those that are returning, and those that are leaving; we may lose your physical presence, but a part of you will remain in Glenlawn forever.








Nobel laureate Dr. Peter Agre, MD, spoke to Glenlawn Mr. Young's Chemistry 40S class at St-Boniface Hospital Albrechtsen Research Centre. Dr. Agre's research in red-blood-cell biochemistry led to the first known membrane defects in congenital hemolytic anemias and produced the first isolation of the Rh blood group antigens. In 1992, his laboratory became widely recognized for discovering the aquaporins, a family of water channel proteins found throughout nature and responsible for numerous physiological processes in humans. For this work, Dr. Agre shared the 2003 Nobel Prize in Chemistry with Roderick MacKinnon of Rockefeller University.













The Successful Futures Program is a program which runs within Glenlawn. This program focuses on employability skills along with academics. In order to create strong bonds with the students, all core courses (ELA, Social Studies, Math and Science) are taught by two main teachers. Students in SFP take the Life-Work Course, in which they learn about job skills. Included in this is an emphasis on Workplace Safety, interview skills and resume building. In addition, students learn which careers will potentially match their personality.

Students also have the opportunity to go out to work sites independently for six weeks each school year, three weeks in the fall and three weeks in the spring. It is at these work sites where our students truly shine, often being offered paid employment once their work block is completed.

- -Create opportunities for youth to set goals and to build leadership skills

- -Build literacy across families
- -Nurture relationships at monthly feasts
- -Focus on staff diversity and capacity building
- -Practice radical love for social justice




Ultimate

Principal Deer, teachers, parents and extended family, friends and honoured guests






